

WIFE HAS HOOD ARRESTED.

New Move in Divorce Case When He Forces His Way Into the House.

PLAINFIELD, N. J., Nov. 18.—Richard Haden Hood, whose wife has instituted divorce proceedings, caused excitement here to-day when he forced his way into the mansion on Stelle Avenue, which he deeded to his wife. Mrs. Hood and her servants are occupying the home, and it is said that Hood demanded that she accompany him to Philadelphia, where he had made arrangements for a settlement.

Mrs. Hood called the police, who found Hood locked in a room on the third floor. The police battered down the door and arrested him. City Judge Demeza, after a conference with Hood's counsel, Isaac P. Runyon, released the prisoner until later in the day, and then the case was adjourned until Saturday.

Mr. Reed, of counsel for Mrs. Hood, says he cannot explain Hood's action unless it was for the purpose of seeing whether he would be allowed to remain in the house.

PROPHET BLESSES MORGAN.

Abdul Baha Writes a Prayer in the Financier's Album.

J. Pierpont Morgan was written down yesterday as one who had done "considerable philanthropy" when his library in East Thirty-sixth Street was visited by Abdul Baha, the Persian prophet. After the patriarch had wandered through the treasure rooms, he paused before the album long enough to write a blessing on the financier and thereto append his autograph. Beneath the Persian script his companion, Dr. Ameen Fareed, wrote this translation:

O, Thou Generous Lord, verily this famous personage has done considerable philanthropy, render him great and dear in Thy Kingdom, make him happy and joyous in both worlds, and confirm him in serving the Oneness, the world of humanity, and submerge him in the sea of Thy Favors.

NOW THE 'VOICELESS SPEECH'

Suffragists Have New Way to Beat Anti-Talking Rules.

A "voiceless speech" is something that the Woman's Political Union will spring on New York at the Land Show. The "voiceless speech" will be delivered by some thirty big cards 22 by 28 inches, on which is printed in plain letters, that can be read at a distance, a continuous suffrage speech. The women will not be allowed to make speeches at the Land Show and the voiceless speech will be used to get around the difficulty.

The cards will be placed on a big easel in plain view of the crowds. The first card will announce: "Woman's Place is the Home." This sentiment is calculated to please the crowd. Then another card will say: "The Woman's Duty is to Look After the Food and Clothes of Her Family."

This also is aimed to please. The third will go on to explain how much of the food eaten by the family is necessarily made outside of the home and how the woman must look after it. The remainder of the cards will set forth woman's need of a voice in politics to protect her home interests.
